Seniors' Lunch

After being entertained by Kurrajong Primary School Band and enjoying our lunch, we sat back to listen to Presentations by Judy Neate and Meigan Williams on the work of 'Peppercorn Services'.

'Peppercorn' normally indicates a nominal fee for services of some kind and the services available in the Hawkesbury cover just about every eventuality.

The Hawkesbury Senior's Leisure and learning Centre on March Street has a comprehensive programme for every weekday, including a Saturday morning 'Heart Moves' exercise session.

Want to learn French, Italian, Computer and discussion of literature? What about Indoor Games, Exercise Classes or Home Cooked Lunches on Tuesday and Thursday?

Peppercorn Services provide transport to Day Centres for activities for groups including disability groups. There is a shopping bus on Monday to the Marketplace and Coles with door-to-door service. There are social outings once a month—perhaps to Bunnings or coffee somewhere.

Visits to Gardens or Historic Sites two or three times a year with a subsidised rate by Hawkesbury Council. There is a volunteer programme of volunteer drivers and carers, funded by the Cancer Council to take people to Nepean Hospital for medical appointments.

Everything in Peppercorn Services is geared to helping in their daily lives, socially and in quality of living, giving strong support where vitally needed.

Meigan is the manager of Community, Youth and Family needs, looking to help provide programmes which will improve lifestyles and reduce the incidence of child abuse. Meigan receives feedback from the public and schools. 'Family Support' is funded by Hawkesbury City Council and covers parenting, meetings and Advocacy and is 'needs-driven', looking to strengthen and help families recover from abusive situations in the 0 to 5 year old range.

Both Judy and Meigan are fully committed to their work in helping others to live fulfilling lives.

Their energy and enthusiasm helped us to understand more of what is happening in our wider community.

A Precis of Rev. Je-Kon Oh's Sermon—in the space available

Precis by John Sturgess of Je-Kon Oh's sermon

On Sunday 18 Sept. Rev. Je-Kon Oh

gave a very clear sermon based on Mathew chap. 22, verses 22-34. These few words can be read and understood without difficulty. As Je-Kon said, sermons are not usually based on such a simple Bible text. Many in the congregation must have wondered, "maybe a short sermon?" Je-Kon explained that the Pharisees had got together to discuss how to discredit Jesus. They decided to ask him a question on Jewish law and expected an immediate answer. It was indeed a challenging task.

The person who asked the question was not someone who wanted to know about the law. He was one of the law experts. He put Jesus to the test. It was a trap. It had been decided to ask what was the great(est) commandment.

When you hear the word 'commandment', you may think of the Ten Commandments, but unfortunately there were more than ten commandments in Jewish law; about 600 commandments.

Law experts put Jesus into this difficult test, fixing their eyes closely on him. In this hot seat, Jesus seems not to have paused to blink. He quoted back to his interrogator two positive commandments that begin with the words, "You shall love . . ." The first one from Deuteronomy 6:5, "You shall

love the Lord your God with all your heart, with all your soul and with all your mind." It means you shall love God totally with all your being. And the next was from Levicticus 19:18, "You shall love your neighbour as yourself." It means you shall love your neighbour as totally as you love yourself. Jesus chose two commandments about 'love'. He said that the essence of the entire Jewish law system was about love in the end.

The apostle Paul put it similarly, "If I could speak any language in heaven or on earth, but I didn't love others, I would only be making a meaningless noise like a loud gong or a clanging symbol.

I mentioned earlier some problems in the Jewish law system, but when we reflect on our own church history, we find the church has sometimes made similar mistakes. There are plenty of examples. One of the reasons or such mistakes was that some Christians forgot the essence of Christian faith. Sadly, in some Christian communities love is taken over by some dogmatics, success and wealth.

Let me ask you now, can you explain to others about what Christian faith is in less than five minutes? Jesus tells us, "you shall love." He bound two important commandments into one, 'You shall love God and your neighbour."

Book Review

There are two books in the Church Library which are guaranteed to challenge our knowledge of Old and New Testament Scriptures.

'90 Minutes in Heaven' - Don Piper / Cecil Murphy

'The Boy who came back from Heaven' - Alex and Kevin Malarkey

Both man and boy were Christians. Each was involved in a fatal car accident, and encountered an 'out-of-this-world' experience.

<u>Don's Story</u> is that of a man with adult perceptions and feelings. He describes being immediately in an atmosphere of love, warmth and light. People he knew came to welcome him and escort him toward the gateway into heaven itself. All around him he heard the sound of angel's wings and glorious music of every kind. He had no memory of his family on earth or awareness of time.

In front of him was a great wall which seemed to have no ending. As the group moved forward, the music and light intensified. He could recognise hymns and chants and praise of every kind, each perfect in itself and distinctive, yet part of a complete whole, glorifying God.

He longed to enter into the Presence of God, to be received by Him, to know the greatest joy that a human being can feel. He moved toward the gate with that expectation and joy in his heart.

Back on earth, although for 90 Minutes he was pronounced dead, a Minister at the accident scene was moved by God to pray that Don should live. His body was crushed and broken. The Minister prayed for life to return to him and specifically that no internal organ, including his brain, would be damaged. Still regarded as dead he was taken to a hospital where vital signs began to show.

<u>Alex's story</u> as told to his father when he started to communicate, is boyish, practical, no-fuss. He was 6 yrs old when his father's car was hit by another car. Alex's neck was broken and his head hung down supported only by muscles. His father was apparently tossed out of the driver's seat.

Alex tells it differently. He stood with Jesus in heaven watching the accident scene. He saw three big angels carry his father to the grass verge.

On earth, a lady 'saw' three small angels holding up a boy's head as his body

was placed on a stretcher, and she accidents. He could help others because prayed about what she was seeing, of the pain which never leaves him. Another lady, an artist, also 'saw' the Later when officiating at funerals he accident and painted a picture of three could assure people so much more angels holding up the child's head.

In a matter of fact way Alex said that he had seen angels in heaven, and had spoken to God. He was told that he he could tell. Others must not be told.

In both stories Don and Alex wanted to stay. What Don longed to see - the face of his Heavenly Father, Alex did not mention. Everything was practical. God is, Jesus is, Angels are, Heaven is.

On return to their earthly bodies each suffered continual excruciating pain and disability. For Don it is on-going, for Alex it is partially manageable.

These stories are out on the Internet and are part of the on-going ministries of Rev Don Piper, and Kevin and Alex Malarkey and their families as they reach out to people who need God in their hearts.

The actual accounts of heaven take only a few pages of these two books. The rest of the books deal with the impacts on their families, coping with inability to do anything at all, having constant hospital admissions, depression, anger, pain. Several years went by with a constant stream of helpers, questioning on Don's part, of managing number on the borrowing list if you with the rods in his legs, of partially would like to read these books. resuming his church ministry and helping others come to terms with extremely painful recoveries

Alex had to learn to talk again, to live in could not stay there; some experiences his wheelchair, and gradually, after several years (supported by slings) experience a semblance of walking. He was able to socialise with his brother and other children but would never walk alone again. He too had rods in his back to keep his body upright.

> Reading this book, the transformation of Kevin Malarkev as he had to come to God in his despair, was a miracle in its own right. He had such a burden of guilt about the accident and was forever castigating himself that it was carelessness which had caused the accident. What set him free was that when Alex could eventually speak, he told his father that the other car was hidden in a dip in the road and it was too late for him to warn his father.
